Hello!

Wow, September and October have come and gone and we are already into the third month of school. Time flies when you're having fun! 😊

We continue to work hard in our reading groups focusing on reading strategies, sight words, and comprehension. Our spelling program has started and everyone is excited to learn how to spell new words in their Journals. Please remember to practice the spelling words and home reading books daily with your child. We've started the *I Belong* unit in social studies and students are focusing on their relationships with others and exploring groups they belong to. We will also be learning about Remembrance Day and incorporating writing activities and art work into our learning. During daily math rotations students have the opportunity to play math games, practice basic facts, problem solve, and work in their workbooks. Currently in the math workbooks we are counting on within 10, comparing numbers to 10, and counting objects to 20. We are continuing to count orally by 5's to 100, by 2's to 30, and backwards from 30 daily in class.

With cooler temperatures upon us now, I want to remind parents to make sure your child is dressed for the weather so they can comfortably play outside at recess.

ELA

Math: Grade 6 students are currently focusing their studies on fractions. They also continue with weekly problem solving work.







Mrs. Lockhart's Classroom Updates

<p>October was all about polynomials. We looked at ways to sort and name polynomial expressions, as well as how to add, subtract, multiply and divide them.</p> <p>In November, we'll be transitioning to linear relations with a look at how to create tables, graphs and equations to represent various scenarios. Equations will then lead us straight into algebra.</p>	<p>Time is flying by! With three doubles in a row, followed by three days off it always seems like math goes fast. The grade 11s have completed their acute triangle trigonometry unit and are now looking at how the sine and cosine laws can be applied to obtuse triangles.</p> <p>The grade 12s have been busy applying their logic as they explore set theory notation.</p>	<p>We've spent the last few weeks diving into the details of the human digestive system and how our body uses the nutrients we supply it to keep things running smoothly.</p> <p>Next up, the respiratory and circulatory system. We are hoping to have Karen from Central Plains Cancer Society back for a visit to talk about the effects of smoking and vaping.</p>	<p>We spent a little bit of time reviewing some grade 10 concepts: balancing and classifying equations, and predicting products before jumping into one of the biggest foundational concepts in chemistry – The Mole!</p> <p>Once we master the concept of the mole students will be able to perform calculations to determine how much of each reactant is necessary to create a certain amount of product in a given chemical reaction.</p>

Now that we are in October, the high school group has already covered a lot of their course work. October was very enjoyable with many activities and lessons taken on by our students.

In ELA 10F students are being introduced to forms of writing, working on narratives, and reading short stories. Grade 11 students have been covering the Canadian fur trade and British colonial rule prior to confederation this month. The grade 11's went on a few field trips, exploring Fort Dauphin and local historic sites in our community (RM plaque, monument at the legion, and the Canton house). Science 10F students have been studying reproduction and human development. Lastly the grade 9 and 10 students have been studying theatre, wardrobe, props, and voice inflection in Drama 15S/25S.



Dear Parents/Guardians and Families,

As I am sure that you have noticed, the use and popularity of e-cigarettes and “vaping” has been increasing in Manitoba. These trends come after years of decreasing smoking rates across the province, particularly among youth.

This trend is concerning as the use of e-cigarettes is not without risk, with evidence emerging around addiction potential and harmful chemicals contained in the vaping liquid. Therefore, as a province, we want to ensure we are being proactive and that tobacco use is not simply being replaced by e-cigarettes.

My office has provided a reminder to all schools that the use of e-cigarettes (as with conventional cigarettes) in any enclosed public space, including schools, is prohibited under The Smoking and Vapour Products Control Act. This prohibition is important to ensure that smoking, be it tobacco or e-cigarettes, is not normalized or thought of as a risk-free activity.


As e-cigarettes are a relatively new technology, we want to ensure that parents are also able to access clear and balanced information to be able to talk to their children. We know that nobody is more influential on a young person’s decisions than their parents and would therefore like to encourage you to explore the resources available from

BEFORE THE TALK: GET THE FACTS

Vaping is not harmless

- › Vaping can increase your exposure to harmful chemicals.
- › Vaping can lead to nicotine addiction.
- › The long-term consequences of vaping are unknown.
- › It's rare, but defective vaping products (especially batteries) may catch fire or explode, leading to burns and injuries.

Risks of nicotine

Nicotine is a highly addictive chemical. Youth are especially susceptible to its negative effects, as it can alter their brain development and can affect memory and concentration. It can also lead to addiction and physical dependence. Children and youth may become dependent on nicotine more rapidly than adults.

Although not all vaping products contain nicotine, the majority of them do, and the level of nicotine can vary widely. Some vaping liquids have low levels, but many have levels of nicotine similar to or higher than that of a typical cigarette. Quitting vaping can be challenging once a teen has developed an addiction to nicotine. Nicotine withdrawal symptoms can be unpleasant. Even if a vaping product does not contain nicotine, there is still a risk of being exposed to other harmful chemicals.

Vaping nicotine can alter teen brain development.

Vaping versus smoking

For people who smoke, completely replacing cigarette smoking with vaping will reduce their exposure to harmful chemicals. However, it is not safe for youth to use any nicotine products, including cigarettes and vaping products.

Vaping liquids

The ingredients typically found in vaping liquids include glycerol, flavours, propylene glycol and varying levels of nicotine. The long-term safety of inhaling these substances in vaping products is unknown and continues to be assessed. There is no burning during vaping; instead, the liquid is heated. This process can cause reactions and create new chemicals, such as formaldehyde. Some contaminants, such as metals, might also get into the vaping products and then into the aerosol.

Did you know?

- › Data from a recent Health Canada survey showed that 23% of students in grades 7–12 have tried an electronic cigarette.
- › Vaping devices may also be used for other substances such as cannabis.
- › Vaping products can be difficult to recognize:
 - Devices come in a variety of shapes and sizes, and some resemble a USB flash drive;
 - Liquids can have high levels of nicotine and come in a variety of flavours;
 - Vaping may not leave a lingering identifiable smell; and
 - Add-ons like vinyl “skins” or wraps can also render these items harder to recognize.
- › Vaping products have many names, such as e-cigarettes, vape pens, vapes, mods, tanks and e-hookahs. They may also be known by various brand names.
- › The *Tobacco and Vaping Products Act* prohibits vaping products to be sold or given to anyone under the age of 18. Be aware of the laws in your province or territory, as some have increased the age to 19.

Did you know?

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Vaping versus smoking

For people who smoke, completely replacing cigarette smoking with vaping will reduce their exposure to harmful chemicals. However, it is not safe for youth to use any nicotine products, including cigarettes and vaping products. If you suspect your child is addicted to nicotine, talk to your healthcare provider.

Vaping is not for youth and non-smokers.



Vaping liquids

The ingredients typically found in vaping liquids include glycerol, flavours, propylene glycol and varying levels of nicotine. The long-term safety of inhaling these substances in vaping products is unknown and continues to be assessed.

The heating process can cause reactions and create new chemicals, such as formaldehyde. Some contaminants, such as metals, might also get into the vaping products and then into the aerosol.

SET A POSITIVE EXAMPLE

If you use tobacco or vaping products, be honest with your teen about the risks, and any regrets, difficulties and health effects resulting from your experience. Talk with your teen about when and why you started to smoke/vape and explain how you thought it would make you feel, and how it is affecting your health.

It is never too late to quit smoking. If you are vaping to help you quit smoking, talk with your teen about it. Talk to them about addiction and how hard it can be to quit smoking. And remember, quitting smoking is possible. For free help, visit gosmokefree.gc.ca/quit or call 1-866-366-3667.

START THE CONVERSATION

Find the right moment

Take advantage of situations where you can talk about vaping. It doesn't have to be formal. For example, when passing by a group of teenagers who are vaping, take the opportunity to have a conversation with your teen about it. Discuss the facts and correct any misconceptions.

Be patient and ready to listen

- > Avoid criticism and encourage an open dialogue.
- > Remember, your goal is to have a meaningful conversation, not to give a lecture.
- > Thank your teen for being honest with you if they tell you that they have tried vaping or vape regularly. Then offer to share some information about the risks of vaping, and discuss the benefits of being smoke- and vape-free.

Get support

- > Ask your healthcare provider to talk with you and your teen about the risks of vaping and ways to be smoke- and vape-free.
- > Consider suggesting that your teen talk with other trusted adults, such as relatives, teachers, faith leaders, coaches, or counsellors whom you know are aware of the risks of vaping. These supportive adults can help reinforce your message.

KEEP THE CONVERSATION GOING

- > Don't expect to have just one conversation with your teen. Odds are you will probably need to talk about the subject many times and in many different places.
- > Strike up a conversation again whenever you have some time together. You will also find that as your teen grows, your conversations about vaping will change and reflect their growing maturity, intellectual abilities and the pressures they face.
- > Keep in mind that talking about it can also set the stage for important discussions about tobacco, alcohol, cannabis, drugs and other risky behaviours.
