Who was involved?

- Professional staff were asked to pre-plan and brainstorm ideas prior to an initial planning meeting. Available literacy and numeracy data and results from the 2021-2022 school goals were shared with staff to provide additional information.
- Students completed the OurSchool survey, providing information in various areas. A staff meeting was held to discuss the results.

How often did you meet?

- Monthly Staff Meetings were used to discuss and plan goals and analyze and brainstorm strategies to support goal achievement.

What data was used?

- Data from the 2021-2022 report cards was used for the literacy and numeracy goals, with caution in mind regarding regression in students' literacy and numeracy knowledge.
- Data from the 2021-2022 end of year F & P reading assessments was used for the literacy goals, with caution in mind regarding regression in students' reading knowledge.
- Data from the 2021-2022 OurSchool survey for mental health indicators was used.
